





This term the spotlight is on... **POND PATROL!**

School Development Priorities & Teaching and Learning update



As a school, we are really keen to share our development journey with our parents and carers, and we hope that you enjoy reading the latest updates about our key priorities as a school!

Key Priority: High-quality teaching

Focus on ensuring high-quality teaching for all – every day; every class. Improve the consistency and effectiveness of teaching through adoption the '5-a-day' approach and instructional coaching to help achieve high quality teaching and learning

Staff development session



Priority 1: High quality

We began the academic year with a staff training session during our INSET day in September, where we looked at the 5 areas that constitute 'high-quality teaching' for all children including SEND. We have subsequently held a series of staff training sessions focusing on different areas such as 'flexible grouping'; 'cognitive and metacognitive strategies' with the

latter being delivered jointly by MBK and Charlton Primary School by Mrs Charlton and Mrs Campbell.

✓ The Senior Leadership Team have continued to look at books and speak to children about their curriculum- we have been delighted to see some amazing learning and to hear the children talk about the curriculum so passionately! It is clear that children are enjoying lessons; remembering their learning and are making links which will help it 'stick!' We know that they are enjoying their regular 'recap' mini-quizzes!



✓ We have welcomed both Richard Evans (CEO of Vale Academy) Trust) and Hazel Pittard (Director of Learning for the Vale Academy Trust) into school twice this term to conduct learning walks across each class in the school. Mr Evans, Mrs Pittard, Mr Rose and Mrs Charlton all commented upon how the teachers in each class



were really making a difference to the children's learning, with lots of elements of our '5-a-day' high



quality teaching approach being seen. In addition, the children in every class were engaged, curious and keen to talk about their learning!



Our children loved the training and it will help them to keep cycling safely while they are out and about!










Operation Christmas Cheer!!!!!



Thank you very much to **Mike Hissey** who so very kindly donated a beautiful, real Christmas tree to our school! As you can see the children absolutely loved it! ©






Book Corner! Looking for a good book? In this section, we have asked two of our teachers to recommend a book they've enjoyed recently!

Children often enjoy the colourful pages and talking about what they would do if they were in Rainbow Fish's shoes (or scales)!





For our older readers, Miss Nyland recommends...




My recommendation is 'The 13-Storey Treehouse' by Andy

Want to become a Parent Governor? We need you!

Recently we put out an opportunity for a new school parent governor to join the small local governing body (LGB) at Millbrook. Sadly, we didn't get any responses at all, so I thought as the only current parent governor I would write a small hello and see if I could get people thinking over the festive period about the possibility starting 2023 with an exciting and rewarding challenge – slightly different from the usual new year's resolutions!

The first question on most minds of course, is what does a parent governor actually do?! Well, after almost a year in the post, honestly, I'm still figuring that out myself! A quick google will tell you that we are in a unique position, the parental viewpoint – having first-hand experience of the curriculum and the ethos of the school through our children.

I have always felt the teachers have had my children's best interests at heart, since they both started with Mrs Betts and the team in Nursery. And it's not just been the teachers, but the teaching assistants, the support staff, and the senior leadership team too. My two little ones have their own unique challenges and personalities, and I couldn't be prouder to say my children go to Millbrook.



So, I have always felt, 'how can I give back?' and 'how can I support and help develop this wonderful school environment in the years to come?' The answer was to become a parent governor!!

First and foremost, we are here to ask questions, with the single most important goal of the LGB to aspire to excellent teaching standards for all children across the school. This means working closely with Mrs Charlton and the senior leadership team to set short and long-term goals; ensure

resources are well spent, and monitor standards across the school. There are a number of other important tasks too, but I won't list them all here, this piece is more to raise awareness, get people thinking, and to tell you that in the role you have the opportunity to have a voice and help shape how the school develops over the coming years.

I won't lie, there is a fair amount of essential material to consume. But you don't have to know it all off by heart. It simply wouldn't be possible! There is also a wealth of additional information that, if you wanted to, you could access through the privileges of the training modules available to you. You also aren't alone – Joanna, the current clerk, is super helpful and the rest of the LGB is filled with lovely people who are all enthusiastic about the school and doing the best we can. There is lots of support.

Having been my first reaction, I appreciate that some will feel "I don't think I have the time". Working full time in a very hectic and demanding job, and with two young children who take up my almost every spare moment, I felt the same. But my overriding desire to support my children, their friends, and the wider children in my local community meant I simply couldn't look the other way and expect, or at least hope, someone else stepped up.

We currently meet roughly every other month, and the meetings last two hours. In preparation for the meetings there is material uploaded about a week in advance to read through at your leisure. So, all in all, I don't find myself worrying, "when am I going to read/research that".

Overall, I'm pleased with how the school is performing and the direction we are taking, but, like the rest of the LGB, I strive for continuous improvement. So, my final thought for those who have stuck with my ramblings, wouldn't we all like to have some positive input and impact on our children's education? With this role, you do!

IMPORTANT MESSAGE

Vehicle idling – please STOP!

Unnecessary vehicle idling is a contributor to local air pollution and increased health risk to the children at Millbrook. One of the areas where unnecessary idling occurs the most is at schools by parents waiting to drop off and pick up their children.

We have included a fact sheet with this letter to give you more information on the hazards of idling and to help illustrate just why this issue is so critical.

We are encouraging parents to make an informal "No Idling" pledge and that you become an active participant in improving air quality and reducing health risks by eliminating idling within the school pick up zone.

The simple but critical change in behaviour of idling your vehicle will drastically improve the air quality in the community and the air your children breathe.

Idling Reduction Fact Sheet

Did you know?

- Each of us takes 20,000 breaths each day
- The average person breathes 3,400 gallons of air a day
- Children breathe 50 percent more air per pound than adults
- Vehicle exhaust is a key contributor to air pollution
- Idling wastes more fuel than turning your vehicle engine off and on again

Handwashing advice



It is essential that everyone washes their hands more often, using soap and water for at

least 20 seconds. Hand washing with soap employs mechanical action that loosens bacteria and viruses from the skin, rinsing them into the drain. Drying hands afterwards makes the skin less hospitable to the virus. Hand sanitiser can be effective if soap is not available or the situation makes using soap less feasible (i.e. when outside).
